Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum

This museum has 26 buildings and is

right next to the water. We walked through the grounds and saw exhibits about oysters and crabs. We saw a replica of John Smith's shallop. I learned about log canoes. I think my favorite part was the lighthouse that was moved here from another part of the Bay.

Hooper Strait Lighthouse This lighthouse has six sides, steel legs, and three floors. It is filled with furniture and other items. Climbing its winding stairs gave me an idea of what it was like to be a lighthouse keeper. I especially liked the porch that wrapped around the tall lighthouse. I could see into the Bay and gaze at the town. Log Canoes Last night we went to watch the log canoe races. The Powhatan Indians first made these canoes. They slowly burned the logs of trees. Then the ashes were carefully scraped away. The English added sails to the canoes. They are big! One canoe was 30 feet long and 5 feet wide. The Old Inn I love this red brick building. It was

built around 1816 and still stands today. Lauren told me that it is one of the few places in St. Michaels to have a cellar. People cooked food in a big fireplace here. Besides being a home, the Old Inn was

also an inn and even a bank!
