## Have Fun With Maggie!

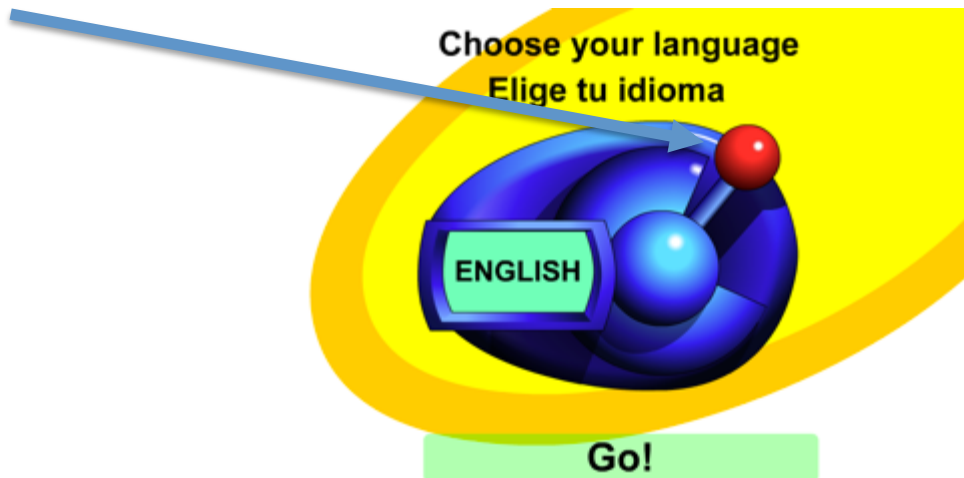
You can have fun with Maggie and her friends.

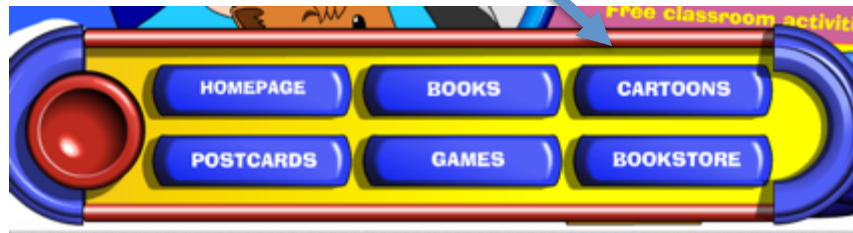
You will see this. Click on Kids.
