Veterans Day

Veterans Day is a special day in the United States. It is always celebrated on November 11. That is because the fighting of World War I ended on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. This is November 11. Many people stop at exactly 11:00 on this day to remember those who fought in this war.

November 11 was first called Armistice Day. But another war took place in the 1940s. Many people from all over the world were again called into battle. Then, in the 1950s, many forces fought in Korea. Veterans service groups wanted the United States Congress to change the name to Veterans Day. This would honor all those who served their country.

The United States holds a ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery to remember those who served in the armed forces. This ceremony begins at 11:00 on Veterans Day. Usually the President of the United States lays a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns. There is a parade of colors and speeches. This special ceremony is shown on television. Many communities have their own remembrances. They hold parades, special gatherings, and dinners for veterans.

It is important that we remember that Veterans Day is more than a day off of school. It is a day to honor the men and women who served their country. Some schoolchildren make cards of thanks for local veterans. Other classes earn money to give to veterans. Is there something that you can do to say thank you to a veteran?

1. This is the 100th anniversary of the start of World War I. What special remembrances would you suggest be held?

2. Why do you think it is important to celebrate Veterans Day on November 11?

3. If you know a veteran what will you do to say thank you this November 11? If you do not know a veteran, what could you do on this special day?

Dear Colleague,

I remember my grandmother calling Veterans Day Armistice Day. I always wondered why she used this name. She also used the phrase Decoration Day for Memorial Day. These old terms have special meaning and we believe it is important to remember the history of these important special days to honor our military personnel. I admit, that when writing this activity, I had to look up the correct use of the apostrophe in Veterans Day, as I wanted to put one in the name of this holiday. I went to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs website to determine there is no apostrophe as the day does “not belong to veterans, it is a day for honoring all veterans.” Those of you who study possessives might find this a good learning opportunity!

We hope you will visit this website http://www.va.gov/opa/vetsday/vetday_faq.asp as there are several resources that can help as you celebrate veterans in your classroom or school. We also suggest children find out more about ceremonies to commemorate the 100th anniversary of World War I. Of particular note is the *Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red* at the Tower of London where 888,245 ceramic red poppies are displayed to honor those British forces who gave their lives in this terrible war. Students can visit the Tower of London website <https://poppies.hrp.org.uk/about-the-installation> to read more about this special art. Extension activities could be writing a biography highlighting the artist who makes these poppies or even drawing a picture of this beautiful and touching art display. My cousin was fortunate enough to see this display in person and talks of the power of this art. Looking at pictures of it would be a good way for children to discover the message that art can convey.

Finally, we at Maggie’s Earth Adventures, think it is important we help our students respect holidays such as Veterans Day and Memorial Day. I once taught at an independent school where it had been decided it was more important to hold school on days such as Veterans Day. This helped children to think of it as a holiday with meaning, not just a day to stay home. The school held special events to honor veterans. We encourage you to integrate Veterans Day into your school day.
